Beloved of God,

I've spoken to many of you over the past several months about the current conflict in Israel/Palestine. I know a number of you have spent time there in different ways, and that what has been happening there since October weighs on many of you. The situation is multifaceted and complex, with deep historical roots that go back decades, if not also centuries. I don't know about you, but the more I seek to understand what is happening, the more I learn how tangled not only the local issues are, but how entangled they are with global politics and dynamics. And so, as I write to you about the conflict this month, I do not write as an expert, only as one whose heart breaks at the great loss of life and human suffering.

In our lives of faith, as Pr. Paul Judson says over and over again, we are resurrection people. This means that we maintain faith and hope and deep trust that God is, even now, making all things new, that God's heart breaks with ours at the suffering of the world, and that God is always transforming the ways of death into the ways of abundant life. This is especially at the center of our lives of faith in this Easter season, as the alleluias of Easter Sunday continue to ring out with joy, and we hear stories of the resurrected Christ gathering, speaking, and eating with the disciples. We turn our hearts this season to the wonder and joy of the mystery of the resurrection, as story, as mystery, and as God's way in our midst, now.

This resurrection promise may seem difficult to reconcile with what we know of violence and suffering locally and globally. And I do not have an easy answer for you. But to say that we stake our lives on the promise that the resurrection is a gift of love and hope and life for all the world, a gift that shapes our lives and calls us into discernment and loving service.

Which leads to my invitation for you in this season. One of the best strategies for understanding complex issues, like the current conflict in Israel/Palestine is to listen to the stories and experience and perspectives of those communities most affected. And so, our Easter Sunday Bible study will explore the story of Jesus through the ELCA's new series *Following the Way of Jesus, A Holy Land Journey*. This series of videos and discussions trace the life and way of Jesus through a historical and contemporary view of the Holy Land. We'll hear scripture, learn about the land Jesus lived in, and hear from the experiences of Palestinian Christians living there today. While this is not a direct deep dive into the current conflict, it will, I pray, grow our understanding of the lives and experiences of our siblings in faith who are living there today. Join us for these conversations starting April 7 at 9:15 downstairs in the library.

And may the grace and hope and peace of the risen Christ be among you and remain with you always!

Former Organ has New Owner

When our church's previous organ console was replaced with a new one during mid-2022, our organ selection committee had studied options from three manufacturers and then recommended one to our Congregation's Council.

Following this new instrument's selection, the committee continued to meet periodically, hoping to find a suitable home for the used organ console. (The Rodgers Organ dealer who sold us the new one was not interested in marketing the old one.)

The committee sought a way for the organ to stay in service somewhere. There had been a realization it might end up being dismantled and its parts offered for use in repairs on other aging organs. It was originally built in 1983 and was first put into service as a demonstrator model for the Rodgers Organ Company, headquartered in Hillsboro, Oregon. Over twenty years ago it replaced a somewhat newer organ console here that was catastrophically damaged by an electrical short traced to its electrical outlet—a total loss.

In early 2022, the used instrument was offered initially to other churches in the region through publicity circulated in the ELCA Rocky Mountain Synod's *eConnection* newsletter—while it was still being played and could be shown in working condition. There were two inquiries but neither party pursued it after congregational leaders learned technical details. One congregation, located at a long distance from available technical services, anticipated that the initial delivery, set up, and periodic servicing would pose challenges. Further interest was not shown by the other party after receiving details. (The organ console had been configured here for use in combination with our six ranks of decades-old windblown pipes. Using it for electronic-only purposes or with differing pipe technologies would require adjustments and re-voicing by an organ technician familiar with its outdated, analog technology.)

By late 2022, an unwieldly woofer cabinet had been sawed in two for its removal from the upstairs organ chamber, making room for the new organ's speaker system. Denverarea organ technician Leroy ("Art") Kuczek contacted us after learning from our longtime service technician, John McGuire, that the used organ was still available, and possibly free for the taking. Kuczek's specialty is Rodgers Organs. Our committee said we would be happy if he could find it a new home, hoping he might not just take it apart and sell it for parts. After generating interest from a few potential buyers, he suddenly phoned me during December 2023 after offering it to an organist who lives in Utah. Although this organist is primarily employed in work unrelated to music, he planned to get the organ ready for use during organist training workshops. He would be conducting those himself periodically in various locations, hauling the organ many miles across a wide area.

On Saturday evening, December 9th, 2023, with the hurriedly assembled help of both Tim Adams and his son Rod, five of us rolled the organ console out of our building's Music Room on an equipment dolly and placed it in this organist's rented trailer, pulled by his pickup. The organist's next stop before heading home to Utah was Kuczek's warehouse, to pick up the speaker system and other electronic components that had been stored there a number of months before.

Hopefully, this article answers some readers' curiosity about "What happened to the old organ?"






