I'm writing this in mid-January when I heard we have set a record for lack of snow. I am praying that by the time you read this there will have been substantial snowfall in our mountains and enough for Wisdom and I to play in down here, and to get us out of the record books. Coming from California, I am familiar with how important the snowpack is for our water supply, especially for those of us here on the semi-arid high plains.

Even now I have been cautioned to water my trees (especially the three fruit trees we planted this Fall) once or twice a month to keep the roots from drying out until the snow or rain comes to replenish all the soil. Water in winter? It makes sense to me as I and my family struggle with the lack of moisture in the air: dry eyes, dry skin, dry nose, dry throat, dry hands, dry eyebrows and hair follicles and cuticles and...

So, I'm praying, to God, that snows will come and replenish the earth and renew the promise of new growth and life in the Spring and Summer ahead and relieve the threats of fire and drought – and dry skin.

Mid-January means I am in the midst of the church's Epiphany season. We celebrated Jesus' birth, where God arrives, *"not only as a human being,"* our Bishop Meghan Aelabouni writes, *"but a child: a vulnerable, fragile, beautiful baby who depends on others for his very survival. Jesus' life, in the beginning as in the end, is placed in the hands of humanity: not so that we can prove our worthiness to God by doing the right thing, but to show that even when we don't – when we squander the gift of divine love and crush the gift of human life – we ourselves are in the hands of a God who turns fear into love, despair into hope, and death into life."* (Bishop's Christmas letter)

Now, mid-January to mid-February, in the Epiphany season of the church year, we focus on how Jesus is revealed as God's incarnation, God's presence in human form. We remember the Magi, wise scholars, who traveled far to give honor to Jesus because they saw in the sky God's message of Jesus' birth. We celebrated Jesus' baptism and saw the Holy Spirit like a dove descend on him and the words from heaven, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased." We visit once more the shore of the Sea of Galilee to see and hear Jesus call the first disciples, Peter and Andrew, James and John, and we walk up the mountain to hear Jesus' revealing, instructive sermon to the crowds, and disciples who are following him. Finally, we will share with Peter, James and John a vision of the 'otherness' that dwells in Jesus as he is transfigured before us, and, again, heavenly words, "This my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased, listen to him." (Matthew 1: 1-8)

Yet we do not cling very long to this "mountain top" experience. Almost immediately, in three days, we come down from the mountain and continue our journey into the next cycle of our church year, the Easter cycle. The first season of this cycle is Lent, and the beginning of Lent is Ash Wednesday, February 18. We remind ourselves on Ash Wednesday of our frailty and our continued need for God's grace for life as we recite the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," and receive an ashen cross on our foreheads.

The 40 days of Lent (Sundays are excluded from the counting) mark a time we turn our attention to fasting, prayer, and alms-giving - activities meant to quiet our minds, still our hearts, and allow us to draw near to God and the way of life God gives us in Jesus, the way of compassion.

A quick word about 'fasting'. It is a spiritual practice to help draw closer to God by **removing** distractions and “things” that separate us from God and prevent us from walking the way of Jesus, the way of compassion. It is not about disordered eating patterns. In fact, it doesn't need to involve food or eating at all. One can fast from social media, electronics or shopping, to name a few examples.

It also can be a season of disciplined **additions**: prayer (remember we need snow, but also peace), works of love, self-examination, looking for ways that God is active in our day, setting aside 10 minutes of silence to simply listen for God's presence, and so on. Whatever gets us closer to God and the way of compassion.

It is important stuff. Bishop Aelabouni says it well in her year-beginning letter to the church: *“As we enter a new year, I find myself pondering what it means to choose that other way [the way of Jesus], especially when the way of the world has brought devastation: in the Holy Land where people in Gaza are still dying months after a so-called ceasefire; in Venezuela, whose people face an uncertain future and hope for a better one; in U.S. Communities where ICE agents have detained, disappeared, or killed our neighbors – including legal residents and citizens; in leaders like Herod who choose the way of power and revel in cruelty; in my own sin, when fear or anger or self-righteousness lead me astray.*

We are called to a different road: the way of Jesus. And we are reminded that when we can't, or won't, choose that path, Jesus finds us on the way regardless: to draw us back to the way of the Gospel and to community and belonging; to give us new life in the promise of resurrection; and to lead us – not by shame or force, but by grace – to abundant life in Christ, as the Holy Spirit works to bring hope and healing to the world God so loves.”



While the Call Committee continues to deliberate and discuss the interview and prayerfully consider this candidate, we are working to schedule another meeting with our Rocky Mountain Synod liaison, Pastor Sara Wirth to discuss questions we might have about the process of calling a TEEM candidate and discuss our sense of how well this candidate might suit our congregation.

Audio/Visual (AV) Committee

An audio/visual (AV) committee was formed to determine how best to leverage the grant our congregation received. Committee members include: Pete Budde, Matt Denman, Stan Elmquist, John Larson, and Lelyn Larson.

To date, the committee has met twice to outline several goals of the project, including:

- Leverage the existing AV equipment we already have
- Improve sound quality of live stream and recorded services
- Display select visual content to the entire congregation in the sanctuary
- Explore range of solutions potentially including mounted cameras, mics, and TV monitors/screens in the sanctuary
- Eliminate waste in printing (hardcopy) materials, e.g., bulletins
- Potentially replace existing speakers (more aesthetic and subtle)
- Add presentation capabilities in the Fellowship Hall

There is progress on receiving bids from a number of vendors to meet the above requirements. All estimates will consider the recurring maintenance & staffing costs in final proposals. Next step, after the holiday season, is to summarize options and present them to the congregation for consideration.
